Food & Ag on the **BALLOT**

Food and farm production are playing a bigger part in this election than in recent years. Food prices are front and center as the indicators of economic health, supply chain stability and – crucially – consumer sentiment.

To highlight how the major party candidates address the food supply chain, we've compiled a list of policies that each has put forward on important issues. Former President Donald Trump has promised to continue the policies and strategies that he employed during his first term in the White House. Meanwhile, Vice President Kamala Harris has floated a few plans to change things up without veering too far from the Biden administration's policies.
